A Promising Period

Following an "endoscopic" period with significant shifts in the administration, structure, and staff of the Norwegian Institute (NIA), we are delighted to announce the return of our *Newsletter* (released twice per year) to communicate our activities and news. We look forward to establishing an additional channel of communication with our friends and colleagues in Norway, Greece, and elsewhere.

After the recent restructuring, NIA is now administratively under the wings of the <u>University</u> of Bergen (UiB), which directly assigns its administrative leader. As of 2022, an <u>advisory</u> board has been formed to provide consultation and guidance to the NIA's staff in their administrative and academic duties and to serve as a bridge between the Institute and Norwegian Universities.

In close collaboration with our UiB administration and the advisory board, we have recently launched our new three-year structured action plan, which aims to enhance the impact of the Institute both as a foreign archaeological school in Greece and as a Norwegian research institution abroad. Our new action plan prioritizes Research, Teaching and Education, and Dissemination of Research from Norwegian universities and colleges (UHR sector).

To communicate our new action plan, we recently visited the Universities of Bergen and Oslo (September 2022 and May 2023, respectively) to meet with the administration and faculty there. A crucial aspect of these administrative trips was introducing the Institute to more departments and faculty members. We are confident our coordinated efforts have already started showing some results in this direction.



Leaving behind for good the idle times of COVID-19 and the promising, with numerous

activities, 2022, the first half of this year has been prolific for NIA. We had the chance to receive many colleagues from Norwegian Universities hosting workshops and seminars on trending topics transcending the broader spectrum of humanities and social sciences (i.e., Social Anthropology, Digital Humanities, and History).

During the same period, we organized a series of <u>open lectures</u> by Norwegian academics from various universities, fulfilling the role of the NIA as a hub for disseminating Norwegian research in Greece and as a node in the academic networking between the two countries. We also invited our archaeological project directors to present the results of their ongoing research. The goal is to establish these lectures on our archaeological projects as an integral part of our annual activities.

In May, we were delighted to receive our latest publication titled *Vikings in the Mediterranean*, following the volume titled *Theory of Museology / Main Schools of Thought 1960-2000*, published in late December 2022. Concerning our publications, we are working with our advisory board to update our publication guidelines and policies.

On a different note, since May 2022, we have launched a new initiative to make the Institute more accessible to Norwegian scholars for research purposes. Our Research Affiliate Program refers to faculty, MA, and Ph.D. students from Norwegian Universities conducting research on humanities and social sciences topics relevant to Greece. The Program allows our Research Affiliates to use the NIA premises and networking to conduct their research.

Aiming to further our role as a reference point for archaeology students, we reintroduced our travel stipend. The updated travel stipend, which now refers exclusively to archaeology MA and Ph.D. students from Norwegian Universities, is already open for applications. The stipend is now titled *The Erik Østby Archaeology Stipend* honoring Prof. Østby for his outstanding archaeological work and impactful contribution to the Institute.

To secure more funding opportunities for visiting students (and disseminate further the work of the Institute), we are working closer than ever with our friends in the Athenæum – Society of Friends of the Norwegian Institute at Athens by

actively endorsing their efforts to support our work. Among our future goals is launching the Athenaeum lecture series delivered annually at NIA by prominent Athenaeum members.

Finally, we have recently concluded the project of updating our digital infrastructure by installing top-notch hardware to provide a smoother attendance experience for our in-person and online attendants. As of 2022, all our open events are also live-streamed via Zoom.

Research Opportunities at NIA

Research Affiliate Program

The Research Affiliate Program launched in 2022 aims to further the role of the NIA as an international research hub and bring under its academic roof researchers and projects from Norway that could benefit from its role as a liaison between Norway and Greece.

Advanced or early-career scholars and MA/Ph.D. students from Norwegian Universities are eligible to apply. The Program offers our affiliated researchers the opportunity to benefit from our international academic network in Greece and abroad, office space at our premises, access to the Nordic Library, and the possibility to transfer books from the Nordic Library to their NIA office.


The Small Cycladic Islands Project; SCIP (6/6-14/7): SCIP is a diachronic archaeological survey of several small, uninhabited islands in the Cycladic Archipelago of the Aegean Sea. The project is a collaboration between the Ephorate of Antiquities of the Cyclades, the Norwegian Institute at Athens, and Carleton College. The project operates under the overall direction of Dr. Demetrios Athanasoulis (Director of the Ephorate of Antiquities of the Cyclades) and is co-directed by Assoc. Professor Alex Knodell (Department of Classics, Carleton College, Minnesota) and Dr. Zarko Tankosic (Center for Early Sapiens Behavior, Department of Archaeology, History, Cultural Studies and Religion, University of Bergen).



The Gourimadi Archaeological Project, GAP (24/6-14/7): GAP includes the systematic excavation of a Late Neolithic-Early Bronze Age site near Karystos in Southern Euboea. The project is directed by Dr. Zarko Tankosic (Center for Early Sapiens Behavior, Department of Archaeology, History, Cultural Studies and Religion, University of Bergen), and co-directed by Dr. Paschalis Zafeiriadis (NIA/University of Bergen), and Dr. Fanis Mavridis (Ephorate for Palaeoanthropology and Speleology).




Apidima Caves Excavation Project (1/9-12/10): The project encompasses the archaeological and geological exploration of Apidima Caves in Laconia, Peloponnese. The excavations at Apidima are conducted under the co-direction of Professor Katerina Harvati (Centre for Early Sapiens Behaviour, University of Bergen; Institute of Archaeological Sciences, and Director of the Senckenberg Center for Human Evolution and Paleoenvironment, University of Tübingen) and Dr. Vangelis Tourloukis (Institute for Archaeological Sciences, Senckenberg Centre for Human Evolution and Palaeoenvironment, Department of Geosciences, Eberhard Karls University of Tübingen).

Theory of museology / Main schools of thought 1960-2000


On December 2022 we published the book *Theory* of museology / Main schools of thought 1960-2000 in our Papers and Monographs from the Norwegian Institute at Athens series.



The book, edited by <u>Dr. Delia Tzortzaki</u> (NIA/ University of Bergen) and <u>Stefanos Keramidas</u> (Ephorate of Antiquities of Cyclades), researches on Museology's theoretical framework in local and global contexts the last 40 years.

Vikings in the Mediterranean

Our most recent publication titled *Vikings in the Mediterranean* publishes the proceedings of an international conference co-organized by the Danish Institute at Athens, Norwegian Institute at Athens, and Swedish Institute at Athens, Athens, 27-30 November 2019. This was the first-ever academic conference on the Vikings in the Mediterranean topic.
